The guest speaker was recently retired US Air Force Colonel (and Air Force Academy graduate) Robert J. Kraus. Kraus was originally from Medina, Ohio.

Colonel Kraus's presentation gave a remarkable overview of the present and future Air Force given his unique assignments and experiences. In his recent retirement Kraus has secured a professorship as the Associate Dean for Flight and Operations in the College of Aeronautics and Engineering at Kent State University.

Prior to his Air Force retirement in July 2019, he was head of Operations and Coordination Divi-

sion, Collaborations Support Office, NATO Science and Technology Organization

(S&T), where he oversaw planning, coordination and execution of the NATO Collaborative S&T Program of Work.

Prior to this, Colonel Kraus served as the Chief Scientist at the US Air Force Academy and oversaw the basic science investments of the US Air Force. Colonel Kraus is a command pilot and experimental test pilot with over 3,000 hours in 32 aircraft and is a recipient of the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal and the Meritorious Service Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters.

He holds a PhD in Aerospace Engineering from Virginia Tech and a Masters in Mechanical Engineering from Georgia Tech. He earned his Bachelor's Degree and commission from the US Air force Academy in 1991.

Colonel Kraus gave his Ohio MOFW audience a background on the testing of various aircraft including the ubiquitous C-130 used for everything from hauling cargo and troops to its special configuration for special operations missions. The research he participated in included how to detect the type of heat-seeking missile attempting to down the aircraft that would determine the suppression system the C-130 would release from the aircraft to thwart the attack. His varied flying experience also included flying specially configured aircraft into category 5 hurricanes.

Colonel Kraus's extensive assignments in Air Force Research were to discover, shape and champion the basic science that will profoundly impact the future Air Force, including areas such as stealth technologies and "smart bombs" (laser & GPS guided). It is not well understood that the Air Force has received more money for scientific research than any other university in the world.

Many things that Americans use today were influenced by Air Force research (the computer "mouse" came out of Air Force Technology). The modern technology developed by the Air Force is so extensive that bombers now perform close air support previously reserved for jet fighters.

Bombs launched from bombers at high altitudes have become smaller and smaller and extremely accurate to kill the enemy but avoid civilian casualties. Kraus noted, "specially configured smart bombs can destroy one part of a house when the target is located, leaving the rest of the dwelling relatively intact"

Kraus also noted that Air Force-funded research has led to 77 Nobel Laurates in the past 64 years. Current and future research is now looking at automated vehicles for the Army and much more sophisticated drone aircraft. That research also includes electro-magnetic pulsing against enemy drones and sensors and electronics technologies that look at passive radar systems.

The MOFW Ohio Commandery once again had an excellent meeting with a sophisticated discussion of the present and future American military that continues to protect America's freedom.

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Captain Bill Tate, USN, Retired

Captain, USN, Retired, Bill Tate was drafted in 1969 during the Vietnam era and served with the Second Infantry Division on the Korean Demilitarized Zone. He was commissioned through Navy OCS in 1978. At sea, Captain Tate served in both Atlantic and Pacific Fleets. Upon completion of his tours at sea, Captain Tate was an officer recruiter and Officer Programs Officer at Navy Recruiting District, Washington, D.C.

Captain Bill Tate, USN, Retired

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In 1987, he transitioned to the Selected Reserve where he had many and varied assignments. He retired from the Navy in 2008. During his reserve service he worked for Raytheon in marketing and engineering services for the Navy Standard Missile-2 Program and then as a project manager for Battelle, from which he retired in in 2013.

Captain Tate is a member of the Military Officers Association of America and has belonged to the MOAA Central Ohio Chapter since 2013. He served as the Chapter's Scholarship Chair and Programs Director, then as President for 2016 and 2017 during which time the Chapter attained MOAA's 5-Star Levels of Excellence Award for both years.

He is active in Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7883 in Westerville. He served as Commander from 2016 to 2019, during which time Post 7883 attained VFW All-State and All-American status. He is President of the Association of the United States Navy, Columbus OH Chapter.

He is a long-term member of Toastmasters in which he has achieved the designation of Distinguished Toastmaster. He has held a number of leadership roles in Toastmasters and was named its District 40 Area Governor of the Year for 2014-2015. He is currently president of the Battelle Toastmasters Club.

CAPT Tate was recently sworn into the Sons of the American Revolution, Benjamin Franklin Chapter in Columbus. He has an avid interest in military history and gives talks on topics in that field. He his wife Patty live in Westerville.

Thomas J. Jenks Major U. S. Army (Ret.)

Tom was born and raised in Sanford, Michigan. He earned his BS degree in Mathematics while enrolled in the ROTC program at Central Michigan University (CMU), where he was commissioned a 2LT in the Army Ordnance Corps in 1973. As a Lieutenant at the Tank-Automotive Command, Main Battle Tank Program Management Office, Warren, Michigan he completed his Master's

in Business Administration in CMU's off-campus program.

As a dual tracked officer, he had acquisition management assignments at TACOM, McDonnell-Douglas Astronautics, Huntington Beach, CA and Allied Signal Aerospace, Torrance, CA. His Tank and Ground Mobility assignments include: Shop Officer 520th Maintenance Company, Korea; A Company Commander, 707th Maintenance Battalion, 7th ID, Ft. Ord, CA; Executive Officer (XO) 8th Maintenance Battalion, Hanau, Germany; Commander European Redistribution Facility, Hanau, GE and Commander 3th Armored Division Materiel Management Center, Germany and Desert Shield/Desert Storm. He had a nominative assignment as Assistant Professor of Military Science at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. His final assignment was as an advisor to the Pennsylvania National Guard's 28th Division as they were transitioning from an Infantry Division to an Armored Division.

Following his twenty-year Army career, Maj. Jenks moved to Cleveland where he taught Army Junior ROTC for another twenty years, mostly at Cleveland's Collinwood High School, but with two years at Minnesota Transitions Charter School, Minneapolis, MN and three years at Ottawa Hills High School, Grand Rapids, MI. While teaching at Collinwood he was recognized in the "Who's Who of American Teachers".
