#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF VETERANS DAY

Veterans Day, formerly known as Armistice Day, was originally set as a U.S. legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, which officially took place on November 11, 1918. In legislation that was passed in 1938, November 11 was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day." As such, this new legal holiday honored World War I veterans.

In 1954, after having been through both World War II and the Korean War, the 83rd U.S. Congress -- at the urging of the veterans' service organizations -- amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation on June 1, 1954, November 11 became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

In 1968, the 'Uniform Monday Holiday Act' ensured three-day weekends for federal employees. Under the bill, as enacted, Veterans Day was moved to the fourth Monday of October. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holiday on its original date. The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971.

Finally on September 20, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed a law which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. Since then, the Veterans Day holiday has been observed on November 11.

#### THE FIRST THANKSGIVING

The original thanksgiving celebration was held by the Pilgrim settlers in Massachusetts during their second winter in America in December 1621. The first winter had killed 44 of the original 102 colonists.

At one point their daily food ration was down to five kernels of corn apiece, but then an unexpected trading vessel arrived, swapping them beaver pelts for grain and providing for their severe need. The next summer's crop brought hope and Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621 be set aside as a day of thanks for and by the colonists that they were still alive.

### KONDRED TO SERVE THOSE WHO SERVED

These Pilgrims, seeking religious freedom and opportunity in America, gave thanks to God for His provision for them in helping them find 20 acres of cleared land, for the fact that there were no hostile Indians in that area, for their newfound religious freedom, and for God's provision of an interpreter to the Indians in Squanto. Along with the feasting and games involving the colonists and more than 80 friendly Indians (who added to the feast by bringing wild turkeys and venison), prayers, sermons, and songs of praise were important in the celebration. Three days were spent in feasting and prayer.

From that time forward, Thanksgiving in America has been celebrated as a day to give thanks to God for His gracious and sufficient provision. President Abraham Lincoln officially set aside the last Thursday of November, in 1863, "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father." In 1941, Congress ruled that after 1941, the fourth Thursday of November be observed as Thanksgiving Day and be a legal holiday.

As November 28, 2019 approaches, let us remember to be thankful for the bounty we enjoy, our freedom of religion, the Second Amendment, our loving families, and our extended military family. To me, Thanksgiving does not cease beyond the third Thursday in November, but it continues into an everyday lifestyle. We should see the value behind being thankful for what we already have, tangible or intrinsic, and celebrate that with the important people surrounding you.

Thanksgiving can be a time to reflect and respond to the blessings that God has provided us. I am thankful to have a family that loves me dearly and I am always thankful to have a roof over my head and food on our table. Be intentional with your time with your family this Thanksgiving. It is often difficult to find a way to get everyone in the same place at the same time, so don't take it for-granted.

#### THE FLAG DRAPED CASKET

Have you ever noticed that the Honor Guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the United States Flag..... thirteen times? You may have thought that it symbolized the original Thirteen Colonies, but we learn something new everyday.

The 1<sup>st</sup> fold The first fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> fold signifies our belief in eternal life.
The 3<sup>rd</sup> fold is made in honor and tribute of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace.

The 4<sup>th</sup> fold exemplifies our weaker nature as citizens trusting in God; it is to Him we turn for His divine guidance.

The 5th fold is an acknowledgment to our country,

for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong." The 6<sup>th</sup> fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The 7<sup>th</sup> fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies.
